Through impactful initiatives, our flagship leadership and professional development programs, and meaningful community engagements, we have made a positive difference in the lives of numerous youth. Our commitment to climate action strengthened in 2022 and we moved toward our goal of reducing our carbon footprint. Through an official circular issued in November, we limited use of one-time plastic items at BYLC events. Similarly, we banned the use of PVC and other non-biodegradable materials for marketing, branding, and communication purposes to reduce the impact on the environment. As the implementing partner of the Global Youth Climate Summit 2022, held in Khulna, one of Bangladesh's most climate vulnerable regions, BYLC also helped bring together 500 youth and a constellation of renowned speakers, climate scientists, and policymakers to explore how today's youth can lead the fight against climate change. We extend our deepest gratitude to our supporters for your unwavering support. Together, we are shaping a brighter future for Bangladesh. Your commitment to creating opportunities for youth makes you an integral part of this incredible journey.








BUILDING BRIDGES THROUGH LEADERSHIP TRAINING

About Buiding Bridges through Leadership Training (BBLT)

BYLC's 10-week-long signature leadership training program is designed for Higher Certificate Secondary School (H.S.C.)/Alim/A Level and first and second-year university students. These are taught through physical classes in Dhaka and Chattogram, as well as through online classes for participants all around the country. Our BBLT program uses a competitive selection process to enroll students from three different educational systems: English medium. Bangla medium. and Madrassa. The intensive training program, coupled with an experiential learning model, challenges students to think critically about leadership and apply their skills to effectuate positive change in society. In the program's first phase, students conduct experiments within the classroom, learn about risk taking, and question their own understanding about society and life. In the second phase, students have the opportunity to translate their learning into action by implementing various community service projects.

For the first time since the inception of BYLC, applications for the BBLT program were open for participants from all over the country. Classes for the national BBLT program were held online.





About Buiding Bridges through Leadership Training Junior (BBLTJ)

BYLC's month-long leadership training program is designed for secondary school students in grades 6 to 10. The program, adapted to suit the learning needs of students aged between 12 and 16, focuses on sensitizing a younger audience to the values of leadership, teamwork, community service, and active citizenship. The program specifically targets students in secondary school to instill positive values during their formative years so that these lessons of leadership and building bridges remain influential throughout their lives.

About Leadership for Kids (LFK)

Leadership for Kids is a two-week-long program designed for students in grades 3-5. The program uses a combination of activities and group discussions to sharpen the participants' leadership, communication, and problem-solving skills.

About The Art and Practice of Leadership (APL)

The Art and Practice of Leadership (APL) is a three-day-long leadership and skills development national workshop, which offers participants an exceptional opportunity to learn how to practice leadership during a crisis. Originally conceptualized at Harvard University, APL is for third- and fourth-year undergraduate students, master's students, and young professionals with less than two years of experience. The program challenges participants' ideas about authority, power, and influence, thereby expanding their capacity to diagnose problems and develop creative solutions. Participants drawn from top universities from all over Bangladesh attain the opportunity to be part of a powerful network of youth leaders.

About BYLC Development Sector Career Bootcamp 2022

BYLC Development Sector Career Bootcamp 2022 was a month-long program to enable participants to gain first-hand knowledge on skills required to enter the development sector. With sessions by industry experts, the bootcamp focused on technical and soft skills such as adaptability, resilience, management, monitoring and evaluation, and effective communication. Apart from an overview of Bangladesh's development sector, the bootcamp included sessions on resume writing, project design and management, project proposal and report writing, data analysis, and efficient communication strategies for development professionals. The bootcamp included a blend of video-based online modules supplemented with instructor-led virtual sessions. Graduates of the program are eligible to avail one-on-one mentoring and counseling sessions from BYLC's Office of Professional Development (OPD).









About BYLC Education and Training Sector Career Bootcamp 2022

The BYLC Education and Training Sector Career Bootcamp 2022 was a one-month program that provided participants the opportunity to learn firsthand skills needed to work in the education and training industry. The bootcamp focused on technical and soft skills like strategic planning, adaptation, resilience, critical thinking, emotional intelligence, data-driven decision-making, effective communication, and public speaking, with sessions led by industry experts. The bootcamp featured introductory sessions on resume writing, content design and management, identity formation, curriculum development, educational evaluation, and adaptive leadership strategies for education and training professionals. A combination of online video modules and instructor-led virtual sessions were included. The program's graduates are qualified to receive individual mentoring and counseling sessions from OPD.





OFFICE OF PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT (OPD)



The Office of Professional Development connects youth to employment opportunities. OPD also offers career guidance services for university students and young professionals. In addition, placement services are provided for OPD graduates via partnerships with renowned employers in the country.

The two-week-long career expo was organized virtually on zoom by OPD. Around 798 registered participants were trained on 21st century skills through capacity building workshops, plenary sessions, networking opportunities with recruiters, and career counseling services. Speakers at the opening plenary of the expo included State Minister of Foreign Affairs Md Shahriar Alam, MP, Centre for Research and Information (CRI) trustee Radwan Mujib Siddiq, Dutch Ambassador His Excellency Anne van Leeuwen, and World Bank's Country Director for Bangladesh and Bhutan Mercy Miyang Tembon. Participants at the expo received direct placement opportunities with 32 reputed local organizations participating at the expo.






The online academy of BYLC aims to make leadership and professional development education available for youth from anywhere, at any time.

Short hour-long courses, as well as week-long courses on 21st-century soft and technical skills such as negotiation, creativity, critical thinking, Excel for professionals, etc., are available on BYLCx.

About BYLC Ventures

Apart from seed funding and technical support, BYLC Ventures offers a range of acceleration support, including a plug-and-play commercial space to work from, customized business training led by successful CEO-turned-mentors, and a suite of professional support such as legal, accounting, and corporate governance.

BYLC Ventures Cohort 5 was launched in July 2022 through a bootcamp with 27 early-stage startups. Four promising startups from the bootcamp received seed funding of \in 8,421 (BDT 0.8 million) each, along with other accelerator support. In 2023, BYLC Ventures awarded scale-up funding of \in 15,789 (BDT 1.5 million) each to its Cohort 2 startups, **Malamal.xyz** and **ParentsCare**. Three startups from the Cohort 4 bootcamp, organized in 2022, also received seed funding, accelerator training, and other business support.

At the closing ceremony, Ambassador of the Kingdom of the Netherlands His Excellency Anne Van Leeuwen inspired the participants to provide solutions to the unique challenges Bangladesh is facing today.

NEW BEGINNINGS

Tahsinah Ahmed joins as the first Executive Director of BYLC

The position of an Executive Director of BYLC was established for the first time in 2022 and Tahsinah Ahmed assumed this role in mid June of the year. Having more than three decades of professional experience in the development sector, she is well known for her work in non-formal-education, skills development and labor migration. She has also worked extensively in policy development and institution building, and effectively led some of the most successful youth-serving and workforce-focused institutions and programs in Bangladesh, including UCEP Bangladesh, where she served as its first female Executive Director, and BRAC's Skills Development Program, which she established and served as the founder Director, and also designed and launched the BRAC Institute of Skills Development.



Global Youth Leadership Center launched

Global Youth Leadership Center, an international nonprofit, began its journey from Bangladesh on October 20 with the inauguration of its first program—the Global Youth Climate Summit, a three-day event in Khulna, Bangladesh. The summit brought together 650 youth (150 in-person and 500 online) from 70 countries to explore how today's youth can lead the fight against climate change.





Promoting digital civic leadership among Bangladeshi youth: Partnership between Meta and BYLC

BYLC and Meta forged a partnership to increase youth civic engagement through digital media. The curriculum is based on the adaptive leadership model of BYLC and equips youth with civic leadership skills and pluralistic approaches. The training covers topics such as exercising leadership without authority, partnering with authority, mobilizing people peacefully, having respectful communication on social media, communicating effectively, using social media safely, spotting misinformation, and collaborating in a diverse setting.

Reorganization

The department for Business Development was renamed as Grants Management department in 2022 with the aim to expand its role to strengthen inter departmental coordination, ensure effective delivery of results, efficient management of funds, ensure equality and timely reporting, diligently manage and nurture donor relationships, proactively identify new funding opportunities and develop new partnerships in this regard.

The Skills Development Training department was renamed as Skills Development Program, broadening its scope to include all the training being provided by BYLC, developing new programs and projects on skills and professional development. The SDP includes Leadership Development Training (LDT) and Professional Development Training (PDT). BYLC's Career Bootcamp and Careerx programs became part of the PDT.

In 2022, the Office of Professional Development (OPD) sharpened its focus on job placement, mentoring & career counseling, and employer engagement.

In order to shape BYLC into a knowledge management and learning organization, the research focus of the department of Research, M&E was strengthened, and BYLC was able to conduct a study on its impact in 2022.

Efforts were made, especially through the strategy development process to strengthen team bonding and developing a common identity of "One BYLC", with youth leadership at the forefront.







EVENT HIGHLIGHTS

Apart from its regular programs in 2022, BYLC was active in engaging youth through events that contribute to their intellectual as well as physical well-being. BYLC created open spaces for youth to discuss relevant issues through programs such as roundtables, workshops, and graduate meets.















Roundtable on Emerging Trends in Development Sector Jobs

A virtual roundtable was organized with officials from reputed NGOs, INGOs, and private sector companies to identify skills required for fresh graduates and young professionals to build their career in the development sector. The insights and recommendations shared at the roundtable helped BYLC Office of Professional Development create and implement an all-rounded curriculum for the BYLC Development Sector Bootcamp.

BYLC Alumni Iftar



Like previous years, BYLC in association with the BYLC Graduate Network organized iftars (the meal to break fast for Muslims during Ramadan) for its alumni and staff at its Headquarters in Dhaka and Chattogram. These annual gatherings offer graduates the opportunity to reconnect with their peers and instructors as well as share their experiences and achievements since graduating from their respective BYLC programs.

Chattogram to Ivy League: Insights from Shammi Quddus

This seminar was held in the port city where Shammi Shawkat Quddus, Product Manager at Google and Co-founder of BYLC, shared her experience on how to best prepare for foreign education and the skill sets required to work for a global organization. In an interactive session, she shared her experience with a full house of students, teachers, and parents on how to prepare for the best foreign education and the right set of skills needed to work for reputed global organizations.



Only One Earth: Youth Activists Paving the Green Way



To celebrate World Environment Day 2022, BYLC hosted a live discussion with three youth climate activists to understand how young people can lead the way and influence others to join the climate movement. The session featured Fahim Hossain, Initiator at Green Lead, Shakila Islam, Chief Coordinator at YouthNet, and Zawad Alam, Team Lead at Project We. Fahim Hossain is a graduate of the first Global Youth Climate Summit organized by BYLC while Zawad Alam is a BYLC Youth Leadership Summit graduate.

Visit of British High Commissioner to Bangladesh H.E. Robert Chatterton Dickson to BYLC

BYLC hosted H.E. Robert Chatterton Dickson, British High Commissioner to Bangladesh, and Frances Jacks, Director of Communications, British High Commission, at its Headquarters in July 2022. During the visit, the High Commissioner and Ms. Jacks interacted with BYLC President Ejaj Ahmad and BYLC Executive Director Tahsinah Ahmed, the BYLC team, as well as the participants of the BYLC Ventures Bootcamp 2022. They also met and congratulated the winners of the BYLC Value Awards 2022.



BYLC Value Awards 2022

Every year BYLC acknowledges its team members with the value award for practicing its six core values. Six members of the team were felicitated with the Value Awards for upholding the office culture by practicing the values promoted by BYLC. The staff were nominated and shortlisted for the awards by their colleagues for demonstrating individual values at the workplace. The six core values practiced at BYLC include integrity, respect for others, empathy, excellence in everything we do, continuous development, and practicing adaptive leadership.



Global Youth Climate Summit 2022



The international nonprofit, Global Youth Leadership Center (GYLC), was launched through the Global Youth Climate Summit in October 2022. The three-day long summit brought together 500 youth virtually and 150 youth in person at a center in Khulna. 200 saplings were planted along the coastline of Sundarbans as a symbolic gesture. The summit included the participation of renowned climate scientists, policymakers, entrepreneurs, leadership experts, and youth climate activists. Sessions focused on the science of climate change, intergenerational collaboration for climate action, the future of energy, and modernizing farming and responsible consumption. Along with GYLC founder Ejaj Ahmad and BYLC Executive Director Tahsinah Ahmed, the closing ceremony of the summit featured Speaker of the Parliament Dr. Shirin Sharmin Chaudhury, Dutch Ambassador Anne van Leeuwen, and Sir Christopher Ball. Ten global climate champions were each awarded USD 1,000 for their climate action projects.

Visit of Sharlina Hussain Morgan, Cultural Affairs Officer, Embassy of the United States of America, to BYLC



BYLC hosted Sharlina Hussain Morgan, Cultural Affairs Officer, and Jonathan Gomes, Public Diplomacy Program Coordinator, Embassy of the United States of America, at its Headquarters in November 2022. In a meeting with Ejaj Ahmad and Tahsinah Ahmed, Ms. Morgan and Mr. Gomes discussed the impact of climate change, challenges in ensuring that development interventions reach the most vulnerable groups, and the role of BYLC in strengthening the leadership skills of youth.
